### **Spiritual Objectives**

At the end of the sermon discussion, cell members will:

1. Desire to live out the beatitudes in their lives
2. To desire to be a disciple and not part of the crowd

### **Sermon Summary**

The following are the key points of the sermon:

1. The call to be salt and light begins in discipleship – living out the beatitudes in one's life.
2. The foundational beatitude to have is being "poor in spirit". Without this, we will struggle to live out the rest of the beatitudes in our lives.
3. Living out the beatitudes is contrary to the world's pattern of living. Therefore, persecution is to be expected.

### **Sermon Recap (Full Summary)**

Passage – Matthew 5:1-15

1. Introduction
  - As disciples of Christ, we are called to be the difference in society.
  - While everyone else in society wants to do the same, Christians are to be different because we live a 'salt and light' life as an overflow of the beatitudes in our lives.
2. Being "poor in spirit" (5:3)
  - This is the fundamental beatitude from whence all other beatitudes will flow.
  - While the pattern of this world is self-sufficiency", being "poor in spirit" is about recognising our inadequacy to live out the life that God desires.

- Only when we recognise our inadequacy and allow Christ to live in us, can we be salt and light in this world.
3. Being “meek” (5:5)
    - The pattern of this world is self-assertiveness. Meekness is the opposite of self-assertiveness. It is about us depending more on God.
    - It is not being passive, but actively walking in step with God and following His leading, just as Christ did.
  4. Being “those who mourn” (5:4)
    - This refers to mourning over the sins in our lives and our constant struggle with our flesh.
    - Those who mourn will desire for the coming kingdom of God where sin will ultimately be defeated.
  5. Hungering and thirsting for righteousness (5:6)
    - This righteousness is not just something that is put on us (justification), but something that grows in us (sanctification).
    - It is about living a righteous life in this world and a desire for social justice.
    - This may not always be welcomed in the world, and therefore we are to expect persecution.
  6. Being “merciful”
    - This involves our willingness to enter into people’s messes.
    - It is relational and not transactional.
    - Our calling is first and foremost to love our neighbours and be merciful to them.
  7. Conclusion
    - Let us be a disciple and not “the crowd”.
    - Let us allow Christ to mould us to live our lives according to the beatitudes so that we can be salt and light in this nation.

## DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1. **Among all the beatitudes in Matthew 5, which is the one that you struggle with the most?**

### Leaders’ Notes

*This question gives members the opportunity to discuss their various struggles in relation to the various beatitudes. The important point to make here is that it is a journey for all of us. We will make mistakes and fail at times. But the key thing is to keep persevering on in living out these beatitudes. Living out the beatitudes moulds us to become more like Christ.*

### Transition (Wrapping Up & Moving to The Next Question)

When the beatitudes are found in our lives, our lives will become like a light in the dark world. Therefore, let us spur one another on to live out these beatitudes so that we can look like Christ in this world.

2. **The value system of this world and the value system of the kingdom is against each other. Therefore, “persecution” should be expected if we are to live out the beatitudes in the world. Have you ever encountered “persecution” for living out the beatitudes in the world? How should we manage these “persecutions” as salt and light?**

### Leaders' Notes

*The culture of this world does not reflect kingdom values – pre-marital sex, living for ourselves, divorce is an option, etc. When we choose to make a stand in regard to these values, we will encounter “persecution”. Knowing how to manage these “persecutions” in the right way is important for the believer. The goal of this question is to help your members to understand that if we are truly living out the beatitudes, we are to expect “persecution” and to learn from one another’s experiences on how they manage “persecutions”.*

### Transition (Wrapping Up & Moving To The Next Question)

We cannot avoid persecution when it comes. However, we can manage how we respond to these persecutions. The key here is to be like Christ (Philippians 2:5-9) when we encounter persecution.

- 3. As a cell, discuss how you can spur one another on in your journey of living out these beatitudes in your life.**

### Leaders' Notes

*This can be done in smaller groups and translates the sermon into practical application in one’s life. Encourage your cell members to be accountable to each other in the coming weeks on this beatitude so that we can all grow together in Christlikeness.*

### Closing

Being a true disciple involves living out the beatitudes in our lives. Let us not grow weary of reflecting this character of Christ in our world, so that we can be the salt and light in this nation.

### **1. Response to Message**

- That all of us will commit to living out the beatitudes in our lives.
- That we will manage any “persecution” in a Godly way that reflects Christ and not the world.
